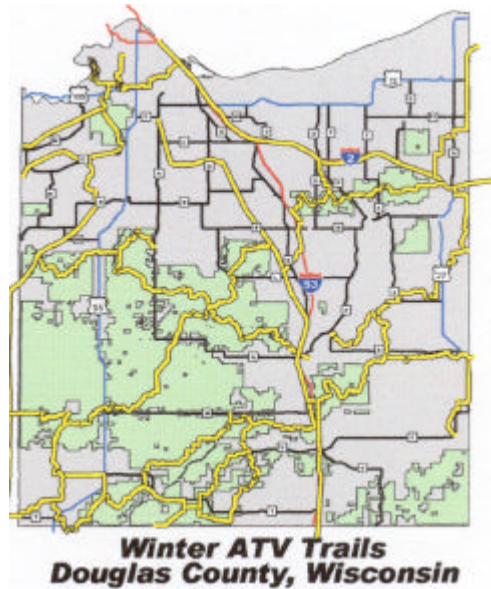

Welcome to Beautiful Douglas County



The Douglas County Forest is the largest county forest in Wisconsin, with approximately 280,000 acres that includes 300 plus miles of state-funded excellent snowmobile trails. These lands

are managed for multiple use to provide a variety of recreational opportunities as well as to provide for timber production.

Douglas County will continue to study and plan to balance the development of the forest for recreational users as well as the timber producers, while still protecting public safety and our soils, waters, wetlands, wildlife and other natural features.

The demand for quiet areas and developed areas will continue to increase on the County Forest. Often users can conflict with other uses. Courtesy and consideration will make the sharing tolerable for all. Please respect the forest and the right of others. To accommodate the wide spectrum of recreational activities requires that some restrictions on use are needed when safety concerns, damage to natural resources, or conflicts between users occurs. Obey all State, County and local laws and ordinances. Speeding on the trails is extremely dangerous to you and to others. Please respect private and no trespassing signs. Do not litter or harass wildlife. There are excellent viewing and photographic opportunities along the trail network. You may encounter some logging activity. Please use caution and respect the logger's equipment as they earn their livelihood. Littering the landscape where you ride invites land and trail closures.

IF YOU HAUL IT IN, YOU CAN HAUL IT OUT!

Go one step further and haul out what less thoughtful persons have left.

Assist others who need help. Always travel with someone in a safe and sane manner. Wear protective clothing and carry a first aid kit and duct tape for emergencies. Do not operate snowmobiles on highways. Obtain direct information locally on conditions or ice before traveling on lake or streams. When someone is overdue, keep calm and notify the Douglas County Sheriff's Department at 715-395-1371 or 911 for emergency calls. Give complete, clear information on the itinerary planned by the missing riders, and do not go out alone searching for them.



Other Snowmobile Trails in Douglas County

Tri-County Recreational Corridor— In addition to the 300 miles of the Douglas County trail system, the Tri-County Corridor is available for snowmobile use. The Tri-County Corridor is a year round, multi-use recreational trail. It consists of over 60 miles of trail, paralleling WI Hwy 2 and stretching from Superior to Ashland. The Corridor is a major connection route to all other trails in Douglas, Bayfield, and Ashland counties, and passes through many interesting rural communities. The trail is fun for snowmobiles, cross-country skiers, ATV's, horseback riders, trail bikers, joggers, hunters, and hikers.

The Tri-County Recreational Corridor is under the jurisdiction of and maintained by the Tri-County Corridor Commission.

Brule State Forest Trail—The Brule State Forest Trail is 26 miles of snowmobile trails from the town of Brule to the upper St. Croix Lake, traversing the Brule River Portage Trail that was historically used by the Native Americans and the early settlers as a passage from Lake Superior to the Mississippi River.

Know the Rules

Non-Resident Trail Passes— All snowmobiles and ATVs that are registered outside of Wisconsin will be required to visibly and permanently display a Non-Resident Trail Pass on the forward half of the snowmobile and/or ATV. The pass costs \$18 for a one-year permit.
